The Idaho Foodbank is the largest distributor of free food in the entire state. Last year, we distributed food for more than 14,000,000 meals through our statewide partner network and direct-service programs. In addition to providing food to more 160,000 Idahoans every month, the Foodbank promotes good nutrition and healthy living through education and collaborative partnerships.

Programs that make a difference

In addition to food distribution, we support various hunger-relief and educational programs that promote healthy families and communities.



Qualifying elementary-age children receive a backpack full of child-friendly food every Friday during the school year to ensure adequate nutrition through the weekend.



During the school year, families of school-age children have access to nourishing, emergency food in an environment that is both familiar and supportive.



From June to August, five days a week, children in low-income neighborhoods enjoy a nourishing lunch and educational/ physical activity provided in a local community park.

The Idaho Foodbank's Backpack program ensures that students who are chronically hungry have access to adequate food over the weekend by providing them with a backpack full of nutritious, kid-friendly food every Friday during the school year.

Making a Difference in Children's Lives

The impact of the Backpack program goes beyond the immediate effect of filling hungry tummies; providing food and keeping hunger at bay impacts a child's social, emotional, and physical well-being. In addition to affecting the child, the Backpack program also helps create happier families by relieving financial stress and the emotional burden of not having enough food in the home. When basic needs are met, children and families thrive.

Survey Results Tell the Story

- 78% of children responded that the backpacks made them very happy.
- 94% of parents definitely or somewhat agreed that the Backpack program helped stretch their household dollars to be used for other critical family needs.
- 97% of parents definitely or somewhat agreed that the Backpack program has made a positive difference in the well-being of their child.



Enabling Success at School

Teachers and counselors report that the Backpack program has created the largest noticeable difference in student attendance, self-esteem, disposition, and energy levels. These positive changes help children learn and enjoy school, which has a significant impact on education attainment down the road.




Developed by Share Our Strength, Cooking Matters is a 6-week, hands-on, cooking-based program for all ages that teaches food preparation and food budgeting skills that people need to make lasting changes to their eating habits. Cooking Matters in the Store is a one-day program that teaches students how to identify healthy and less expensive options at their local grocery store.

A Community-Based Program

The Idaho Foodbank offers 6-week Cooking Matters courses to adults, kids and families. Each course is team-taught by a community volunteer chef and nutrition educator and covers meal preparation, grocery shopping, food budgeting and nutrition. Adult and teen participants take home a bag of groceries at the end of each class. Cooking Matters also offers store tours where participants learn how to shop, plan and budget for healthy and affordable meals.

Solving Hunger in Idaho 2015-2016 FISCAL YEAR



After a course, adult, and teen graduates report that:

- 34% are eating more fruits and vegetables
- 61% are better at planning and cooking meals
- 53% are more confident in cooking skills
- 99% would share things learned in this course with others

Positive Change That Lasts

Cooking Matters changes people's behavior for the better. While The Idaho Foodbank has only been conducting classes since 2010, Share Our Strength created the program back in 1993. Since that time, survey after survey has shown that up to a year after completing the program graduates continue to cook healthier meals, pay more attention to food safety, save money on food purchases, and cook and eat new foods more often. Mothers from low-income families who graduated from this program, are much more likely to reduce the level of food insecurity in their families than mothers who didn't have the training.

Mobile Pantry enables the Foodbank to take large quantities of emergency food to hard-to-reach and underserved communities. Our trucks transport the food and then community volunteers help unload and distribute the food to those in need.

Recognizing The Need

In Idaho, many parts of the state are rural and communities may not have a brick and mortar pantry for supplemental food distribution. These communities may also have higher numbers of food insecurity among families, children and seniors. To help individuals experiencing food insecurity, The Idaho Foodbank takes truckloads of food to targeted communities once every month. This system enables people living in the hardest-to-reach areas of our state to receive the nutritious and wholesome food they need to relieve hunger and stay healthy.

Hunger Doesn't Take A Summer Vacation

The Idaho Foodbank is a sponsor of USDA's Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) that provides free summer meals to children ages 1-18. For children from families who are at or below poverty, the summer lunch program fills an important nutrition gap when school meals are not available. In addition to a nutritious meal, The Idaho Foodbank enlists volunteers from the community to provide enrichment activities and nutrition information to program participants. Volunteers range from single individuals to groups from various organizations. All volunteers are required to complete a background check.

During the school year, families and school-age children have access to emergency food in an environment that is both familiar and supportive. Pantries stock food items such as fruit, canned tuna, peanut butter, and pasta that are popular and easy to prepare. Families receive enough food to prepare nourishing meals for three to five days.

Recognizing The Need

Early in the Backpack program, the Foodbank staff recognized that more than 80% of participating students were sharing their weekend food with siblings and parents. Rather than make more food available in the packs, program specialists decided that a better solution would be to provide families with food through a pantry set up inside the school where access would be convenient for students and family alike. A School Pantry pilot was launched in 2010 with three schools and the full support of school staff. Since its debut, the program has shown steady growth and is now considered in concert with the highly successful Backpack program.

Survey Results Tell the Story

- **98%** of parents agreed that without the School Pantry program, their family would have to skip one or more meals.
- **100%** of parents said the program had made a positive difference in the well-being of their family.
- **95%** of parents said program participation improved their overall communication with the school.



Promoting Student and Family Engagement

School staff notes that the School Pantry program has improved relationships and communication with families. Moreover, participating families consistently show an increased interest in their child's academic performance, as well as greater awareness of school events in general.
